

Resident Spotlight: Frederick and David Rike



Frederick Rike

Frederick Rike (1867-1947) was President of the Rike-Kumler Department Store Company in Dayton. He began at Rike's as a salesman and a buyer of notions, handkerchiefs, hosiery and gloves. He eventually worked his way up to the post of President, which he held for 40 years, seldom missing a day at work in the store. It was Frederick Rike who moved the store to the corner of Second and Main Streets that it anchored for so long. He was active during the recovery efforts from the 1913 Flood and served on the charter commission which reorganized Dayton's government under the city manager format. He had worked for the establishment of the Miami Valley Conservancy District, and served as president of the Dayton Boy Scouts and Community Chest.

Frederick Rike died on November 19, 1947 and is located in Section 37 Lot 1226.

David L. Rike (1904-1982) carried his family's legendary Dayton department store into the 20th century. Rike's Department Store, a long and storied Dayton institution, was founded by David's grandfather in 1853. David's father, Frederick, inherited the family business and upon his death in 1947, David was elected president. In 1965, he became board chairman and chief executive officer.

As Rike's expanded and progressed and flourished under David's tenure, he maintained a staunch humanitarian mindset, even creating a special employee fund for families experiencing financial distress. In turn, he always encouraged his employees to give back to the Dayton community.

A graduate of both the Princeton School of Business Administration and Harvard School of Business Administration, Rike used this business acumen for the betterment of the Dayton region. His dedication to Rike's historic Second and Main location exemplified his love and belief in downtown Dayton.

David L. Rike was born on October 24, 1904 in Xenia, Ohio and died on January 16, 1982 in Dayton, Ohio. He was married to Margaret Craighead Shaw. He is located in Section 37 Lot 1226.


Moments in Time from our Friends at South Park Historic District

Elisha Brabham

Elisha Brabham was born in Virginia. He was the first man to receive a Masonic Degree in Dayton at St. John's Lodge # 13, the oldest Masonic Lodge in Dayton, chartered in 1812. Mr. Brabham was also the first man in Dayton to deal in wheat. In 1820, Elisha, along with Henry Leatherman, built the "Old Red Mill" on the foundation

of the burned out "Cooper Mill" on the corner of Water and Mill Streets in Dayton. The mill was torn down when attorneys, Alexander Grimes and Edward W. Davies, executors of the large Daniel C. Cooper estate, used part of the money to change the bed of the Mad River in order to make way for the extension of the canal basin.

In 1826, Mr. Brabham was elected President of the Select Council which is equal to today's City Commissioner. In 1856, prominent attorney, Madison N. Munday, held auction to sell the estate of Mr. Brabham. The auction was held at three o'clock, Saturday the 24th of August at the door of the courthouse and sold to the highest bidder was the real estate, the home, store room and a stable, all appraised at \$2,400.00. The section of Alberta Street between Burns and Oak was originally named Brabham Street.



Elisha Brabham married Lydia McCollum, who was the daughter of Hugh McCollum, on February 1, 1816. Their children were: Charles and Henry C. (who were removed from the old Fifth Street cemetery and reinterred at Woodland), Joseph; Susannah and Hannah.

Elisha Brabham died December 10, 1855 at the age of 68. He is located in Section 8 Lot 104. There is no marker for Elisha on the lot.

Tailgating with Trees

The Ohio Chapter of the International Society of Arboriculture (OCISA) is holding a series of free educational programs for green industry professionals at Woodland Cemetery and Arboretum from October 2017 through April 2018.

In October, the subject was "Proper Tree Planting" with instruction and discussion on soil tests, tools, tree handling, hole size, root flares, material management, to stake or not to stake and mulch placement.

The November course was about "Tree Hazard Defect Identification" and hit upon what constituted a tree hazard, what the tree risk assessment is, what TRAQ is, wood decay and why it matters, tree defect identification - branch unions, splits/seams - response growth, and woods and internal decay.

Each class has the format of 12:00 - 12:30 pm: Bring your own lunch and network with green industry professionals then from 12:30 - 1:30 pm: Hands-On Learning/Instruction/ Discussion.

December 2, 2017 Winter Plant Identification #1

How to identify plants without leaves; important taxonomic keys in dormant plant identification; what resources can you utilize to assist in dominancy? Identification will include Acer, Aesculus, Abies, Amelanchier, and Betula.

January 25, 2018 Winter Plant Identification #2

Identification will include Buxus, Catalpa, Celtis, Carpinus, Carya, Cercis, Chiocanthus, Cladrastis, and Crateagus.

March 22, 2018 Winter Plant Identification #3

Identification will include Eucommia, Fagus, Fraxinus, Gledistia, Gingko, Gymnocladus, Hammamelis, Juglans, Juniperus, Larix, Liquidamber, Lirodendren, Magnolia, Metaseguoia, and Nyssa.

April 19, 2018 Winter Plant Identification #4

Identification will include Ostrya, Picea, Platanus, Populas, Prunas, Pseudotsuga, Pyrus, Robina, Sassfras, Taxodium, Taxus, Thuja, Tsuga, Ulmus and Zelkova.

Instructors for the course include:

~Mark Webber, a Board-Certified Master Arborist and a Certified Professional Horticulturist with nearly forty years of relevant professional experience. He is a practicing arborist and horticulturist who provides investigations, reports, and testimony in matters related to tree condition, maintenance and removal; management of nursery, arboricultural, and landscaping operations; and an assortment of horticultural issues.

~Rich Pearson is a degreed horticulturist and retired chief horticulturist from both Chadwick Arboretum in Columbus and Cox Arboretum in Dayton.
