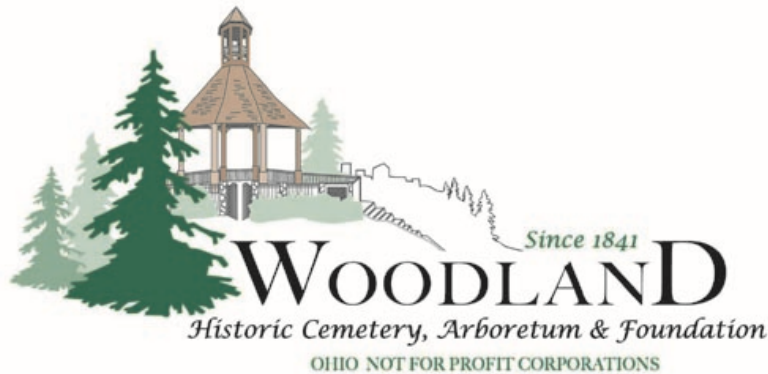

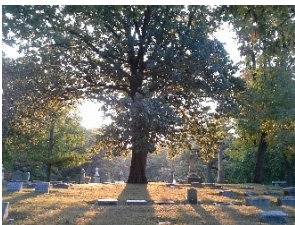


### ***Woodland Cemetery and Arboretum's Year in Review***



Each year Woodland Cemetery and Arboretum selects projects most important to the 1500 families that we serve and the over 48,000 visitors we receive each year. We continue our educational outreach program by giving over 200 tours, programs and presentations to the community partnering with Dayton Metro Library, University of Dayton Osher Lifelong Learning program and Sinclair Community College.

Woodland is continuing its focus on the care of the Arboretum including yearly ash tree treatment to save the remaining ash trees that are on the grounds, removal of several distressed trees and those damaged from the ever-present wind and rain storms in the area.



In February of 2018, Woodland was awarded Level II Accreditation by The ArbNet Arboretum Accreditation Program and The Morton Arboretum for achieving particular standards of professional practices deemed important for arboreta and botanic gardens. Woodland will be listed with the Morton Register of Arboreta, a database of the world's arboreta and gardens dedicated to woody plants.

An additional Columbarium was installed at the Lookout to increase the number of cremation niches in this location. Following industry trends, cremation services in Ohio continues to grow and we continue to provide unique locations with beautiful views for families seeking this option.



In the spring of 2018, Woodland installed a new fountain in the pond to assist us with the management of algae growth and giving a larger and quieter spray for visitors to view and enjoy. The Fountain Cremation Garden continues to offer families a natural and green space location for their loved ones.



July 11, 2018 was the 175th Anniversary of the first burial in Woodland Cemetery. Allen Cullum, a native of Butler County, was buried at Woodland on July 11th of 1843. A celebration of this anniversary was held in partnership with the Grand Lodge of Ohio, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, whom Allen Cullum was a member of. Their participation in the event was a memorable occasion for all attending.

2018 was the third year for the Summer Work, Earn and Learn intern program. We had 8 high school students work two days a week for 9 weeks. They did maintenance in the existing gardens and worked on a project removing and replanting a landscaped area in Section 309. They were able to participate in the 175th Anniversary celebration and received a tour of the cemetery that focused on the notables of Dayton and their significance to the history of Dayton. The students also cleaned and restored several historical monuments including work on the 1847 Receiving Vault.



Woodland once again worked with the Sinclair Summer Bridge program. This program allows students participating in a variety of Sinclair majors to earn credit by volunteering at local non-profit

organizations to learn more about the community they live, work and play in. A group of 7 students and an advisor came to the cemetery for two hours and assisted with the clean-up of the Schantz Mausoleum and took a tour of the cemetery to learn more about Dayton's history.



Woodland continues to offer free tours and programs to the public and private specialty tours to partners in the community. This year WDPR 88.1 Classical, Miami Valley Non-Profit Collaborative Network, Faith and Friends

Radio, Dayton Rotary Club, WYSO Leaders and Aviation Trail, Inc. came out for special group tours.

Woodland embarked on Phase I of its Capital Campaign by breaking ground and building onto the Administration Offices. The modest addition will allow us to move forward with the overall goal of the restoration of the historic Chapel.

Fundraising efforts are still underway and we encourage all to come to Woodland to see how we are progressing. If you would like to learn more and would like a private tour, please let us know and we will be more than happy to accommodate your request.

The **Horticulture Fund** assists in the creation of scenic, reflective and beautiful gardens and grounds to honor those that have gone before us. This includes the distinctive floral displays in the chapel area in our Mausoleum. A unique theme and design is chosen during the Easter, Memorial Day and Christmas holidays.

Our **Arboretum Foundation** continues to focus on the restoration, preservation, horticultural and educational projects needed to keep Woodland a cultural resource for Dayton and Ohio.

The **Chapel Restoration Fund** is designated for the restoration and preservation of the historic chapel, gates and administration office built in 1887. The Chapel houses 17 Tiffany windows, a hand-cut Tiffany tiled floor and hand painted Tiffany frescoes. All three structures are listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

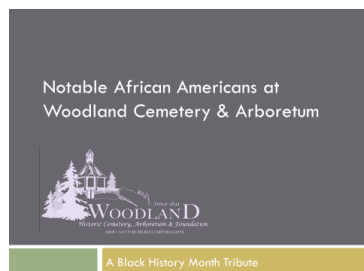

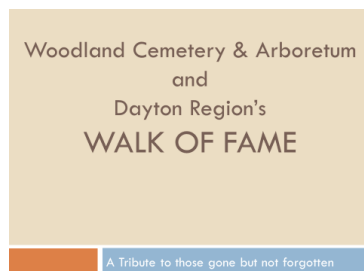
#### **Black History Month - A Celebration of African Americans at Woodland Cemetery**

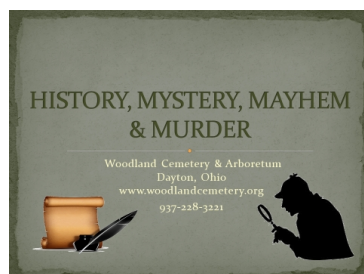
#### **Bottoms Up! The Early Brewers of Dayton**

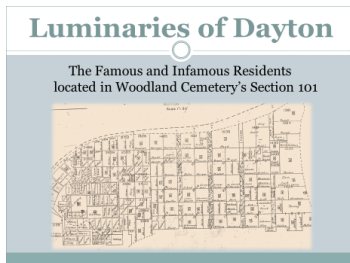
#### **Dayton Region Walk of Fame and Woodland Residents**

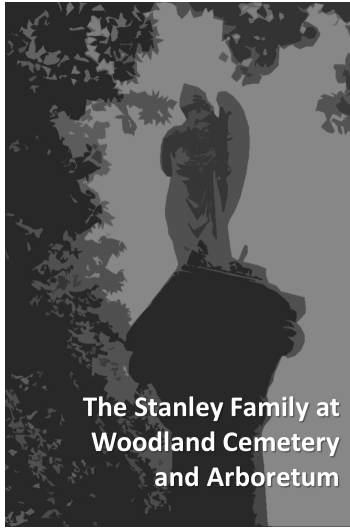
#### **History, Mystery, Mayhem and Murder**

## **The Stanley Family at Woodland Cemetery and Arboretum**

Levi and Matilda Stanley were the second set of King and Queen of the Gypsies in Dayton. Matilda was buried on September 15, 1878 creating the largest attended funeral ever to take place at Woodland. The newspapers at the time report that over 20,000 people attended her service. This booklet features historical newspaper articles about the Stanley Family and a transcription of the Levi Stanley ledger at his grave site.

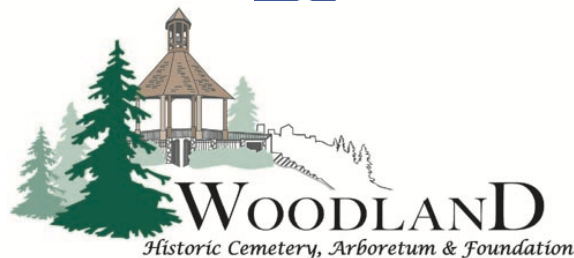
