

Dog Days of Summer

Historically, the 'dog days of summer' are associated with heat, drought, thunderstorms, and lethargy. Nowadays, we mainly see them as the hottest, most uncomfortable part of the summer season.

Spanning from the second week in July through the first week of August, the 'dog days' take their name from Sirius, the brightest star of the constellation Canis Major. This 'Great Dog' appears on the horizon during the hottest part of the year; following his master, Orion, into the night sky.


Find Erwin Gangl's delightful dachshunds in the Woodland Mausoleum; columbarium 10, column A, tier 3.


oldest rural cemeteries in the United States.


Tree Tour




