

National Aviation Day August 19, 2024


Did you know that Woodland Cemetery is part of the Aviation Trail? Established in 1981 to promote and preserve Dayton's aviation heritage; the Aviation Trail is a non-profit in partnership with the National Parks Service. As the final resting place of the Wright family, Woodland is proud to be part of the story of Dayton's role in the development of flight.

Tomorrow (August 19th) is National Aviation Day. It was created by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, who chose Orville Wright's birthday to officially honor the development of aviation in 1939.



Coincidentally, Orville and his sister Katharine were born in the same room—on the same date three years apart. Though we don't tend to hear as much about the Wright Sister, Orville and Wilbur would have had trouble soaring as high as they did without her.

To celebrate National Aviation Day, let's wish a happy birthday to some of Woodland's most famous siblings; Orville and Katharine Wright.





Orville Wright (1871-1948)

Orville was born August 19th, 1871, in the Wright family home at 7 Hawthorn Street here in Dayton, Ohio. He had three surviving older

Katharine Wright Haskell (1874-1929)

The youngest of the Wright siblings, Katharine was the only surviving daughter of Milton and Susan Wright. When Susan died brothers; Reuchlin, Lorin, and Wilbur—and would have one younger sister, Katharine, born when Orville was three years old. None of the Wright siblings have middle names their father, Milton, chose to give his children distinctive first names "so they wouldn't need middle names".

Orville was more impulsive and optimistic than Wilbur. He was intelligent, showing an early interest in math and science; though he was not remembered as a great student. Mischievous both in and out of the classroom, those who knew Orville described him as a shy prankster. He was a natural at mechanical engineering, known for taking things apart to figure out how they worked. Orville also played the mandolin, though it doesn't seem like his siblings appreciated it much. In a letter to her father (ca. 1900), Katharine wrote;

"Orv has begun lessons on his mandolin and we are getting even with the neighborhood for the noise they have made on pianos. He sits around and picks that thing until I can hardly stay in the house."

When Orville was about seven, his father brought home a present from his travels; a toy helicopter. Wilbur and Orville were entranced. When the paper and cork toy finally broke, the boys became determined to make themselves another one—and a lifetime fascination with the possibilities of flight began. of tuberculosis in 1889, Katharine was just one month shy of fifteen years old. The loss of her mother was devastating. In the wake of their mother's death, Katharine, Orville, and Wilbur became practically inseparable—they called her 'Swes', a German nickname for 'little sister'.

Now the only woman in the family, Katharine was expected to assume the responsibility of managing the Wright household. By taking on the domestic duties usually reserved for wives and acting as both confidant and sounding board, Katharine made it possible for her widowed father and unmarried brothers to fully devote themselves to their work.

Katharine was intellectually curious and did well in school, excelling in Latin and Greek. Unlike her brothers, she struggled with math. The only Wright sibling to earn a college degree, Katharine graduated from Oberlin College in 1898. Back in Dayton, she became Latin and history teacher at Steele High School.

Outgoing and self-assured, Katharine made friends easily. Her natural ability to chat comfortably with just about anyone would go on to be invaluable when her much shyer brothers began demonstrating their flying machines to the rich and famous in Europe.

In 1908, Orville and Wilbur had two main contracts—the Unites States Army, and a group of European investors. To demonstrate their flying machine on both sides of the Atlantic, the brothers decided to divide and conquer; Wilbur would go to France, and Orville to Fort Myer (near Washington, D.C). Initial flights had gone well. Katharine sent letters to both brothers, demanding to hear all the details of their success.

The letter she got back was not what she'd hoped. Orville had been in a serious accident—his leg was broken, his hips were damaged, and he'd fractured several ribs. His passenger, Lt. Thomas Selfridge, was not so lucky; he was the first person to ever die as a result of a plane crash.

The news of Orville's accident, and Katharine's response to it, marked a major turning point in



the story of the Wright Brothers. Already a strong family unit, the Wright Brothers were about to become a worldwide sensation; and their success was in no small part due to their little sister, Katharine.






