The Montgomery County Fair begins today!

Alexander Swaynie and the First Fair

At East First and Race streets, Alexander Swaynie established a tavern and wagon-yard.


The wagon-yard was full of teams almost every night with the frame house crowded and the men thinking themselves fortunate when, having brought their own blankets, could find a space to lay their head on the floor.

Mr. Swaynie made money rapidly and in April 1839 erected a three-story brick building on the site of his first frame house. It was considered a first-class house, and regarded with pride by the people of Dayton.

All of the carpets in the hotel were manufactured by the Dayton Carpet Company and were of such superior texture, designs, and colors that guests of the house found with difficulty that they were made west of the Alleghany Mountains.

The Montgomery County Agricultural Society had been organized September 11, 1838, with Colonel Henry Protzman president, and Charles Anderson secretary.


The first Montgomery County Agricultural Fair was held in Dayton at Swaynie's Hotel, at the head of the basin on October 17 and 18, 1839. At eleven in the morning on the 17th, a procession of about three hundred persons

interested in the society marched, headed by a band of music, through the principal streets to the hotel, where the anniversary address was delivered by D. A. Haynes.

In 1860, a single ticket cost 25 cents, a horse and rider could enter for 35 cents, and for a dollar a family could spend three days.

Where: Montgomery County Fairgrounds, 645 Infirmary Road, Jefferson Twp.

Cost: Daily admission \$10/person, age 6 and under free with paying adult. Includes parking, if available. Discounted pricing will be available for veterans, senior citizens and first responders on Tuesday, July 13.




We are offering guided tours again!
