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

Richard Blandy

World Champion Pole Sitter

A few weeks ago we gave you the story of "Buckeye Dixie" Blandy, the World Champion Pole Sitter. We were contacted by several people who loved the story of this larger-than-life character with a big personality and smile to match. Jim Sandegren (pictured right), former Director of Horticulture at Woodland from 1988 until 2003, sent an email to Angie Hoschouer, Manager of Development and Marketing, and shared an interesting story of how Mr. Blandy received his uniquely engraved headstone.



"Dale Huffman and I got together," said Jim, "and arranged for the headstone that marks the grave now. His family had refused to provide a marker so Dale and I prevailed upon the cemetery management and the engraver to provide the modest marker that adorns Mr. Blandy's grave."

In an email to Mr. Huffman, Jim wrote, "The Dixie Blandy's of the world will probably always have to die to receive any recognition for their remarkable stunts."

Jim also loves poetry and would often write poems about Woodland - its beauty, and residents. He wrote a poem for Richard Blandy and we hope you enjoy it as much as we do. Thank you Jim!

Dixie Blandy By Jim Sandegren

Beneath the grass his soul shall lie and none shall know him there.
His earthly grave betrays no mark or stone to bear his name.
The distant drums to which he marched are silent everywhere
And only ghosts can greet him now acknowledging his fame.

The lofty view that crowned each day appeared for no one new.
The cold and rain he came to know could leave a numbing feel.
While scorn would judge and doubt the drive that came for very few.
And all the while he'd sit and smile with visions that were real.

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Though men may point and gestures give expressing as they may
Their narrow worlds of toil and sweat competing one and all.
But from his perch above the fray he heeded night and day
With no concern or feeble smile that he might fade or fall.

Throughout this land from far and wide they came with spirits high
To see his place of majesty found high above the realm
And whisper words of mock surprise at pigeons as they fly
Above his place and past his eyes so high above the elm.

The Dixie Blandys of this world will find no fame or gold
And none will speak their credit as our simple world goes round.
But fame's unspoken countenance will quietly unfold
The simple truth, their great escape so high above the ground.

Richard Blandy was born in 1902 and raised in Vieux Carre, Louisiana. He was a Creole, five feet, four inches tall, and generally maintained a weight of 150 pounds. Various accounts recall his experience as a circus worker, boxer, house painter, Merchant Marine, riveter, steeplejack, flagpole painter and salesman.

Richard's first flagpole sitting experience was in 1929 when he answered a classified ad by Goodrich Rubber Company and Texaco, earning \$600 for climbing a spire atop a new service station in Tampa, Florida.

By 1933, he claimed title as champion flagpole sitter during 77 days and nights at the Chicago World's Fair.


In 1954, he set a flagpole standing record after 10 days at the Michigan State Fair.

In 1960, he established a bicycle record for 13 days and nights atop a 50-foot pole in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina.

In 1964, Richard broke his own 1933 sitting record on the Steel Pier in Atlantic City, New Jersey after 78 days.

And in 1965, he had proclaimed the world title at Grona Lund Amusement Park in Stockholm, Sweden after sitting 125 days in a chair 200 feet above the ground. During his stay he drank 92 bottles of whiskey and smoked 3 packs of cigarettes a day.

On May 6, 1974, Richard Blandy died at 72 years of age when a flagpole collapsed in Harvey, Illinois at the Dixie Square Mall. He is located in Section 201 Lot 271 at Woodland.



Blandy had six wives, having been divorced three times and widowed three times. He was known to meet his younger wives through telephone conversations with fans on the ground during his many flagpole sitting exhibitions.

Johnny Carson interviewed him while he was sitting on a 155 foot pole for the Tonight Show in the mid-1960s.

As others broke his records, he dismissed their attempts since they had built elaborate sitting platforms, while he continued to use a small seat as his primary mode of sitting.

Blandy made his winter home in Dayton, Ohio, for over 60 years, bartending to make ends meet. Known as "Dixie-on-the-Ball" and "Buckeye Dixie", he wanted his epitaph, to read: "The World Super Champion Flagpole Sitter and a good American."




